Understanding the Role of Anger in Forgiveness: Is it Legitimate?

#1.) Is it a sin to be Angry?

Ephesians 4:26a (ESV)

"Be angry, and do not sin"

No, it is not a sin to be Angry. The anger is not the sin. It must be how we handle it.



#2.) Does God get Angry? YES

A. Psalm 30:5a

For His anger is but for a moment, and His favor is for a lifetime. Weeping may tarry for the night, but joy comes with the morning.

B. Psalm 78: 38-39 outlines some attributes regarding God's anger:

vs. 38a *Yet, He, being* (full of) *compassionate, atoned* (forgave) *for their iniquity, And did not destroy them.*

Compassion present...leads to forgiveness, control of wrath

vs. 38b *He restrained His anger often and did not stir up all His wrath.* Yes, many a time He turned His anger away, And did not stir up all His wrath;

HE chooses OFTEN to turn His anger away and controlled his response(wrath) so it wasn't all stirred up

vs. 39 *He remembered that they were but flesh, a wind that passes and comes not again.* For He remembered that they were but flesh, A breath that passes away and does not come again.

Kept <u>who and what man is</u> in front of His response (man is but a vapor, fragile and temporary)

- Do these verses state that God does or does not own Anger?
- Do these verses state that God does or does not make choices regarding His Anger?
- Do these verses state that God has arrived at a spiritual plane and therefore does not experience Anger?

ANGER IS AN ATTRIBUTE OF GOD

So...?ASK: Is it a sin to be angry?

#3.) Does Jesus get angry?

Matthew 21:12-13 [right after the triumphal entry]

¹² And Jesus entered the temple and drove out all who sold and bought in the temple, and he overturned the tables of the money-changers and the seats of those who sold pigeons. ¹³ And He said to them, "It is written, My house will be called a house of prayer. But you are making it a den of thieves!"^(A)



Cross references

A. Jeremiah 7:11

¹¹ Has this house, which is called by My name, become a den of robbers^(d) in your view? Yes, I too have seen it. "^(B) This is the Lord's declaration.

John 2:14-16

¹⁴ ^(Δ)In the temple he found those who were selling oxen and sheep and pigeons, and the money-changers sitting there. ¹⁵ And making a whip of cords, he drove them all out of the temple, with the sheep and oxen. And he poured out the coins of the money-changers and overturned their tables. ¹⁶ And he told those who sold the pigeons, "Take these things away; do not make ^(B)my Father's house a house of trade."

#4.) Can Anger be a motivator for good?

Ephesians 4:25-27

²⁵ Therefore, having put away falsehood (lying), let each one of you ^(A)speak the truth with his neighbor, for ^(B)we are members one of another. ²⁶ ^(C)Be angry and do not sin; do not let the sun go down on your anger, ²⁷ and ^(D)give no opportunity to the devil.

VERSE 25

A.. Colossians 3:9 Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have put off the old self with its practices Ephesians 4:15 Rather, speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head,... Zech 8:16 These are the things you must do: Speak truth to one another; make true and sound decisions within your gates

1 Thess 5:19 Do not quench the Spirit.



Grieve: **mourn**, feel sad, be sad, lament, suffer, be distressed, be upset, be unhappy, sorrow, sadden **afflict**, pain, distress, aggrieve, upset, sadden, depress, hurt How do we grieve the Holy Spirit? Hanging on to anger, which grows into unforgiveness, which grows into bitterness, rage, fighting, speaking

How do we grieve the Holy Spirit?

³¹ (M)</sup>Let all bitterness and wrath(rage) and anger and clamor(brawling) and slander (evil speaking) be put away from you, along with all malice.

M. Col 3:8 But now you must put them all away: anger, wrath, malice, slander, and obscene talk from your mouth.

³² ^(N)Be kind to one another, tenderhearted,

N. **Col 3:12-13** Put on then, as God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, compassionate hearts, kindness, humility,...

1 Peter 3:8 Finally, all of you, have unity of mind, sympathy, brotherly love, a tender heart, and a humble...

⁽⁰⁾forgiving one another, as God in Christ forgave you.

O. **2 Cor 2:5-7** Now if anyone has caused pain, he has caused it not to me, but in some measure—not to put it too severely—to all of you. ⁶ For such a one, this punishment by the majority is enough, ⁷ so you should rather turn to forgive and comfort him, or he may be overwhelmed by excessive sorrow.

2 Corinthians **2:10** Anyone whom you forgive, I also forgive. Indeed, what I have forgiven, if I have forgiven...

Mt 6:14 For if you forgive others their trespasses, your heavenly Father will also forgive you,

"Don't grieve God. Don't break His heart. His Holy Spirit, moving and breathing in you, is the most intimate part of your life, making you fit for himself. Don't take such gifts for granted. Make a clean break with all cutting, backbiting, profane talk. Be gentle with one another, sensitive. Forgive one another as quickly and thoroughly as God in Christ forgave you." (MSG)



It is okay to be Angry when....

Someone who has wronged me knew they were doing something wrong and did it anyway.

Someone has purposely treated me as lesser than them.

Someone has tried to publicly humiliate me.

Someone has tried to intimidate me in private or in public.

Repeatedly I have tried to work out conflict with someone, and they have made fun of me or ignored my attempts.

Someone has purposely taken advantage me.

A person had the opportunity to make a bad situation between us better and has repeatedly refused to do so.

An evil person has purposely hurt me, taken advantage of me.

L/G WHAT WOULD YOU ADD?

NOTE: Feelings can be the alert that our boundaries have been crossed or beaten or ignored. They do not lead the march into conflict, but they are the warning system.

Legitimacy Check List

(How to define if your emotional struggles with this issue are legitimate)

- My life has been adversely impacted by someone who has had serous personal problems.
- I have had a willingness to work out interpersonal tensions, yet it has not born fruit.
- The person who wronged me knew he or she was doing wrong, but persisted anyway.
- In spite of my attempts to be reasonable, I have been faced with stubbornness or repeated wrongs.



Understanding the Role of Anger in Forgiveness: Is it Legitimate?

- I feel that my good nature was clearly taken advantage of.
- My sense of trust or loyalty ultimately worked to my disadvantage.
- My desire for a fair and pleasing relationship was not matched with similar commitment or enthusiasm.
- As I look back upon the wrong behavior of another person toward me, I realize it was propelled by selfish or controlling motives.
- The misdeeds of the other person toward me could have been altered but were not.
- I have felt as if I was being treated as an inferior person.

The Role of Anger OR The Byproducts of Anger

Think about these behaviors:

- Because of past pain I feel I need to keep my guard up more carefully than before. (Is this wisdom? Not being so naïve.)
- My sense of dignity was harmed, and I now want to hold more firmly to that dignity.
- I have resolved that wrong was done to me, and I need to do all that is possible to see that it is not repeated.
- Virtually anyone else who experienced what I did would probably have felt angry just as I did.
- Because of past mistreatment, I am more resolved than ever to hold on to firm convictions.
- My emotional scars remind me of how I need to be more forthright about my feelings and needs.
- I tend to be more sensitive toward others when I learn they have been subjected to difficult circumstances similar to my own.
- When I sense that the wrongdoer could still commit the same misdeeds as in the past, I wince as I recall my feelings associated with that memory.
- I now have a desire to speak out more immediately when I witness foul treatment.
- You could say that I'm not as naïve or as innocent as I used to be.
- 1.) Are these ALL a BY PRODUCT of anger?
- 2.) Are they healthy to have and to experience?
- 3.) Do these behaviors help establish new boundaries?
- 4.) Do these behaviors help with self discovery? What is really important to us?

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Read to you Jesus' ie: (Just listen)

Mark 11:13-32

¹¹ But ^hthe chief priests stirred up the crowd, so that he should rather release Barabbas to them. ¹² Pilate answered and said to them again, "What then do you want me to do with Him whom you call the ⁱKing of the Jews?"

¹³ So they cried out again, "Crucify Him!"

¹⁴ Then Pilate said to them, "Why, ^jwhat evil has He done?"

But they cried out all the more, "Crucify Him!"

¹⁵ ^kSo Pilate, wanting to gratify the crowd, released Barabbas to them; and he delivered Jesus, after he had scourged Him, to be ¹crucified.

¹⁶ ^mThen the soldiers led Him away into the hall called ³Praetorium, and they called together the whole garrison. ¹⁷ And they clothed Him with purple; and they twisted a crown of thorns, put it on His head, ¹⁸ and began to salute Him, "Hail, King of the Jews!" ¹⁹ Then they ⁿstruck Him on the head with a reed and spat on Him; and bowing the knee, they worshiped Him. ²⁰ And when they had ^omocked Him, they took the purple off Him, put His own clothes on Him, and led Him out to crucify Him.

²¹ ^pThen they compelled a certain man, Simon a Cyrenian, the father of Alexander and Rufus, as he was coming out of the country and passing by, to bear His cross. ²² ^qAnd they brought Him to the place Golgotha, which is translated, Place of a Skull. ²³ ^rThen they gave Him wine mingled with myrrh to drink, but He did not take it.

²⁴ And when they crucified Him, ^sthey divided His garments, casting lots for them to determine what every man should take.

²⁵ Now ^tit was the third hour, and they crucified Him. ²⁶ And ^uthe inscription of His ⁴accusation was written above:

THE KING OF THE JEWS.

²⁷ With Him they also crucified two robbers, one on His right and the other on His left. ²⁸ ⁵So the Scripture was fulfilled which says, ^w"And He was numbered with the transgressors."

²⁹ And ^xthose who passed by blasphemed Him, ^ywagging their heads and saying, "Aha! ^zYou who destroy the temple and build it in three days, ³⁰ save Yourself, and come down from the cross!"



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³¹ Likewise the chief priests also, ^amocking among themselves with the scribes, said, "He saved ^bothers; Himself He cannot save. ³² Let the Christ, the King of Israel, descend now from the cross, that we may see and ⁶believe."

Even ^cthose who were crucified with Him reviled Him.

His whole life works appears to amount to nothing!

How did Jesus handle this?

Luke 23:34 "Then Jesus said, 'Father forgive them for they do not know what they are doing.""

Notice Jesus did not say, I forgive you. He asked the holder of the penalty to totally erase their wrong doing...so no payment would be extracted.

Would you be able to ask that, pray that, for the 'two really mean things'?

The parable of the King and Servant

READ NIV Matthew 18:21-35 (seventy times seven) Matthew 18

The Parable of the Unforgiving Slave

²¹Then Peter came to Him and said, "Lord, how many times could my brother sin against me and I forgive him? As many as seven times?"^(ω)

²² "I tell you, not as many as seven," Jesus said to him, "but 70 times seven.²² For this reason, the kingdom of heaven can be compared to a king who wanted to settle accounts with his slaves. ²⁴ When he began to settle accounts, one who owed 10,000 talents²⁶ was brought before him. ²⁵ Since he had no way to pay it back, his master commanded that he, his wife, his children, and everything he had be sold to pay the debt.²⁰

²⁶ "At this, the slave fell facedown before him and said, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you everything!' ²⁷ Then the master of that slave had compassion, released him, and forgave him the loan.

²⁸ "But that slave went out and found one of his fellow slaves who owed him 100 denarii.¹⁰ He grabbed him, started choking him, and said, 'Pay what you owe!'

²⁹ "At this, his fellow slave fell down¹⁰¹ and began begging him, 'Be patient with me, and I will pay you back.' ³⁰ But he wasn't willing. On the contrary, he went and threw him into prison until he could pay what was owed. ³¹ When the other slaves saw what had taken place, they were deeply distressed and went and reported to their master everything that had happened.



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³² "Then, after he had summoned him, his master said to him, 'You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you begged me. ³³ Shouldn't you also have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?'⁽¹⁰⁾ ³⁴ And his master got angry and handed him over to the jailers to be tortured until he could pay everything that was owed. ³⁵ So My heavenly Father will also do to you if each of you does not forgive his brother^[11] from his^[12] heart."⁽¹¹⁾

And that's exactly what my Father in heaven is going to do to each one of you who doesn't forgive unconditionally anyone who asks for mercy."

What happens to us when we don't forgive? We show indifference... Indifference to the greatest thing God did. Sending Jesus to die on the cross for our sins. To be forgiven for so much, we cannot forgive the smaller things.

Can I forgive w/o expecting the wrong doer to receive any penalty AT ALL!

They probably deserve it. How do I forgive unconditionally? What does that look like? Do I even want to do it?
